fter our short membership subscription 'holiday', last year we took the decision to ask, once again, for a membership fee. We set subscriptions at £12 for an Individual Membership and £20 for a couple (Double Membership). But circumstances seem to change so rapidly that we have had to look again at our subscription rates.

We are aware of the current financial situation, affecting virtually everyone and so we have taken steps that will make becoming a member of Belgrave Heritage Trust less of a drain on your purses. We have decided that, for this year, we will reduce our Individual Membership fee to £6. We have also taken the decision to scrap our discounted Double Membership, so that we now have a single rate for all members. 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We're in the Old Laundry at Belgrave Hall

ast year the Trust was invited to make use of the "Old Laundry" room in the courtyard of Belgrave Hall, as part of a project by the Leicester City Museums Service to provide free entry to the hall and gardens every Wednesday afternoon and on the first full weekend of every month between April and September. We displayed photographs of old Belgrave around the room, and there was always at least one member of the Trust available to greet visitors and talk about the photographs or their particular memories of Belgrave. We purchased a number of large maps of Belgrave, dating back to 1886, laminated, and put them on display. These proved to be very popular, as did the whole project – over a thousand people came to visit it during the season.

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We're at Cross Corners

ince the Pandemic, and the closure of Claremont Street Methodist Church, the Trustees have struggled to find a suitable venue to resume our regular series of talks. Our presence in the "Old Laundry" led to a meeting with Kate Bull, manager of the Cross Corners Community Arts Centre, next door to Belgrave Hall, on Thurcaston Road. Now we hire a room at Cross Corners when we hold our talks.

Because the Trustees had not had the opportunity to book speakers in advance, two of our members, Sandra Moore and Nick Fathers provided us with a photographic tour of changes to Belgrave and the surrounding district, for which there was no admission charge.

Subsequently, Cynthia Brown told us about "Belgrave at Work and Play", and in November Sandra Moore gave a very poignant talk - "Some Mother's Son", that told the story of some of the servicemen from Belgrave who lost their lives as a result of the First World War. An admission charge to both was made. All of the talks were well attended, and the refreshments afterwards provided the opportunity for some interesting conversations among the attendees.

In December we held an informal party at Cross Corners to thank the people who had attended the talks. We provided refreshments (thanks to Carolyn and Christine for all that buttering and slicing!), and a quiz; and a free prize draw rounded off the afternoon. Unfortunately, due to limits on the number of people able to attend, it was by invitation only but we hope that this year we will be able to extend the invitation to more of the members. We have been invited to use Cross Corners again this year, and it is hoped to hold at least one talk in the evening for those members who are unable to attend in the afternoon.




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Heritage Open Day

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Armistice Day 2022

arlier last year we received a call from The Venerable Richard Worsfold, Archdeacon of Leicester, to inform us that St. Peter's was being advertised for sale again. During the conversation, the subject of Armistice Day and the fact that we had not been allowed to lay a wreath at the war memorial in St. Peter's was mentioned. Richard offered to "see what he could do", and, some weeks later, we received confirmation that we would be allowed to lay a wreath inside the building - but that we would not be able to have a service.

On November 11th, the Trustees met a representative of Andrew Granger, the estate agent, at St. Peter's. A two-minute silence was observed at 11am outside the building, and then a wreath was laid inside, at the war memorial by Andy Warren on behalf of the Trust.

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Bite-Sized Belgrave

Our archive of information about Old Belgrave is growing steadily – here are just a few of the nuggets you can find.

- **X** Cross Corners, on Thurcaston Road, was once the home of members of the Ellis family. During the First World War it provided a safe haven for Belgian refugees.
- **X** Claremont Street was named after a ship commanded by Captain Atchieson, who came to live there. The captain found the original name of the street objectionable. Its name? *Backside*.
- \(\mathbb{H} \) The Talbot Inn was once a three-storey building, but after a fire in the 1950s, the top floor was removed.
- ## The oldest headstone which we can identify in St Peter's churchyard is that of Thomas and Elizabeth Stanton. It dates from 1667 just one year after the Great Fire of London.
- ₩ Once upon a time Belgrave Avenue was called Avenue Road; until that name was hijacked to be used elsewhere in Leicester.
